Tasting Note: Its light red color, shows the use of Portugieser grapes used for rosé. Known as Portugieser Weissherbst, Portugieser wines are also light red in color and their alcohol content is lower than other red wines. These wines are low in acidity, palatable, pleasing, full-bodied, and fresh. They are lightly fruit, with hints of currant, raspberries, and strawberry

Pinot Meunier: This secret grape of Champagne is renowned for its rich strawberry fruit and luscious mouthfeel. This varietal can add fragrant spring flowers, fresh strawberries and apricot when blended. The name 'Pinot Meunier' (in French: 'Meunier' and in German: 'Müller') is translated as 'Miller' and come from the flour-like dusty white down on the underside of its leaves. In Germany, Pinot Meunier is used most often to make still red wine under its synonyms: Schwarzriesling, Müllerrebe and Müller-Traube.

Portugieser: This very old grape variety is believed to have originated in Austria. It was introduced to Germany in the 1800's. The Portugieser grape is the third most important red grape for the German wine industry. It covers 11,571 acres (4,683 hectares) and can primarily be found cultivated in Pfalz, Rheinhessen, and Ahr regions.
